ARTIST STATEMENT

Disappointments and shortcomings are at the heart of the human experience, and lately have served as jumping off points in my creative practice. In a quite literal tip of the hat to the past, many of the pieces in this exhibition are those resuscitated from my studio's archives- paintings and drawings that had been tucked away out of disinterest or disappointment. Through this work, I am reconstructing my past and those events that occurred within it-real or imagined, dreamt of or heard about. Everyone deserves a second chance.

Woven into simple visual narratives using words and pictures from a laundry list of sources, these works are often injected with the absurd and surreal, heavily influenced by graphic design work I do by day and comic books I have read voraciously throughout the years. With directed paint drips, written and then obscured notations, cartoon bubbles, viscera, muted voices, and incomplete thoughts, I make assumptions. With an infusion of nostalgia, confusion, and longing, I extrapolate a story from morsels of truth-so that it might become something else entirely.

For all the potential that visual arts have to enrich our lives and reflect society's direction, an artist's creations are often a powerful venue for self reflection. Amy Greenan's new work is based on the purity of visual impulses that compel her selection of subject matter, medium, and materials. Growing out of her post-graduate figurative work featuring intense, unabashed, and passionate reflections of self, Greenan's latest work is elevated to a new level through what she describes as "a desire to take the figure into a new direction."

While there continue to be aspects of personal trials, tribulations, and self discovery in her work, she has matured with a boldness of imagery, an infusion of memoir-like notations, and stylized font appropriations. Greenan's images range from painterly renditions of houses and Hudson Valley landscapes to unyielding self portraits.

Derived in part from her self-portraits, the house paintings are "ripe with metaphors...exuding additional facets of the body," states Greenan. Particularly in *6801 Maple Rd.* (2009), the house functions as a different type of vessel entirely—as a literal body of expression or containment. Like the body, they shelter and enclose elements of character and memory. Conversely, interiors once emptied become elements of abandonment and isolation. As a house becomes a home, the mind develops and refines memories through the ongoing act of reflecting on one's life and actions.

The paintings *Lady Godiva's Operation* (2008) and *The Fetch* (2008) function as doppelgangers of sorts. At first, appearing as a double portrait, these works respond to each other more as a reflection or peripheral vision. Doppelgangers

have historically been seen as omens, as if one might have advance knowledge of an impending achievement or exploit. In *Lady Godiva's Operation*, the disquieting void of the black background is interrupted by the sinister red cloud-form as it appears over the shoulder of the figure. It reads as if an emerging apparition is preceding an uncertain course of action. These works present an uncomfortable feeling of uncertainly, foreshadowing some misdirection or obscuring the true intentions behind the works.

Greenan's exhibition continues with a generous number of small works on paper. These works incorporate monoprinting, commercial appropriation, and handworking. They are more immediate and intimate, "functioning as working diaries," states the artist. The sporadic writing and short notations employ voyeuristic undertones, offering the viewer brief looks into her private life. Greenan's use of "passive codes" and privately relevant images allow her to take chances visually and experiment with arrangement and design. These works on paper offer insights into her meditative process of creativity. Each one is an idea, feeling, or emotion liberated thought the act of creation.

Nothing Was About to Happen offers viewers a glimpse into Greenan's private world. Each work of art provides a sense of mystery and nostalgia for facets of life lived as well as the anticipation of experiences to come. She intentionally omits and limits the amount of visual information shared, provoking viewers into misinterpretations. Ultimately, through her own intentions, her works reflect a sense of place, taking note that place is not always singular—past or present.
